


A quick guide to my drawing style


- Use a grid, and lightly mark key points where your subject intersects the lines.
- The aim is to slowly bring the whole image into focus, rather than getting bogged down in detail early on.




- Begin to add more outline, erasing the grid lines you won't need later.
- Keep it simple you'll fill in some of the gaps later, but in some areas you might not feel the need.




 For important parts of the face - like the eyes - you might want to mark out key spots, like where the corners sit, and where the iris meets the eyelid.
Measure with a ruler if it helps.




- Start adding detail, trying to see the eye as just a series of lines and shapes.
- There's no need to include everything you see at this stage, you can fill in gaps later where needed.




- To describe tone and form, look for areas of darkness and isolate them.
- Fill each area by hatching (or crosshatching) - the darker the area the closer your marks should be.




 Don't feel the need to draw the outline of the eye before the iris - you're trying to forget that what you're drawing is an eye, so the order in which you describe it doesn't matter.




 Slowly make your way outwards from the eyes, capturing the sockets and eyebrows, but without getting carried away with detail.




 Head down to the nose, again trying to see this as just a series of shapes, and isolating areas of darkness for hatching.




 Consider the face as a whole - when describing how dark each area is, make sure you're comparing it with the tone of the whole image, and not viewing it in isolation.




 As with the eyes, don't feel the need to draw the full outline of the mouth before filling in its detail.



- Now is a good time to look at the neck and shoulders.
- I usually prefer to just suggest this area, allowing the viewer to fill in the blanks.



 And it's your call as to how much detail you want to provide around the forehead and hair. Sometimes I describe this, sometimes not.



- Finally, use a softer pencil to go back over the darkest areas, for definition.
- Sometimes I add white pencil for highlights, and sometimes full colour.
 But that's for another day!
